

## CHAPTER 57.

An Act to amend the Law relating to Commons. [22nd September 1893.]

A.D. 1893.

 $\mathbf{B}^{\mathbf{E}}$  it enacted by the Queen's most Excellent Majesty, by and with the advice and consent of the Lords Spiritual and Temporal, and Commons, in this present Parliament assembled, and by the authority of the same, as follows:

- 1. This Act may be cited for all purposes as the Law of Short title of Commons Amendment Act, 1893.
- 2. An inclosure or approvement of any part of a common Consent of purporting to be made under the statute of Merton and the statute Board of Agriculture of Westminster the second, or either of such statutes, shall not be essential to valid unless it is made with the consent of the Board of Agriculture. inclosure.

- 3. In giving or withholding their consent under this Act, the Conditions Board shall have regard to the same considerations, and shall, if of consent. necessary, hold the same inquiries as are directed by the Commons 39 & 40 Vict. Act, 1876, to be taken into consideration and held by the Board c. 56. before forming an opinion whether an application under the Inclosure Acts shall be acceded to or not.
- 4. Nothing in this Act shall preclude Her Majesty Her heirs Saving of and successors, or any person whatsoever whose rights or interests existing rights. are affected by any inclosure or approvement, from taking any proceedings by way of information, action, or otherwise, for the abatement of such inclosure or approvement and the protection of such rights and interests.
