The Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs to the United States Ambassador at London

Your Excellency,

Foreign Office, 9th September, 1952.

I refer to the Exchange of Notes between the Governments of the United States of America and of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Northern Ireland relating to the application of most-favoured-nation treatment to Western Germany and the Free Territory of Trieste which took place in London on

6th July, 1948(1).

In view of the changed circumstances relating to the control over foreign trade in Western Germany, including the accession on 1st October, 1951, of the Federal Republic of Germany to the General Agreement on Tariffs and Trade, the Government of the United Kingdom propose that the Exchange of Notes of 6th July, 1948, be considered no longer effective so far as it relates to Western Germany.

If the United States Government agree to this proposal, I have the honour to suggest that the present Note and your Excellency's reply in that sense shall be regarded as placing on record the agreement reached between our two Governments in this matter.

I have the honor to refer to your Excellency's Note of 9th September, 1952, stating that in view of the changed circumstances relating to the control over foreign trade in Western Germany including the accession on 1st October, 1951, of the Federal Republic of Germany to the General Agreement on Tariffs and Trade, your Government proposes that the Exchange of Notes of 6th July, 1948, between the Governments of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Northern Ireland and of the United States of America relating to the application of most-favored-nation treatment to Western Germany and the Free Territory of Trieste be considered no longer effective so far as it relates to Western Germany.

My Government concurs with the Government of the United Kingdom and Northern Ireland in the foregoing proposal, and also agrees to the suggestion that your Excellency's Note and this reply shall be regarded as placing on record the agreement reached between our two Governments in this matter.
