MARITIME CONVENTIONS (continued)-

"The Government of Sweden holds the view that it is in the field of technical and nautical matters that the Organisation can make its contribution towards the development of shipping and seaborne trade throughout the world.

"If the Organisation were to extend its activities to matters of a purely commercial or economic nature, a situation might arise in which the Government of Sweden would have to consider resorting to the provisions regarding withdrawal contained in Article 59 of the Convention."

Convention. Load Lines

On January 9, 1958, Her Majesty's Government informed the States parties to the Convention that the following amendment to Annex II of the Convention, proposed by the Australian Government, had been accepted by all Contracting Governments and that Annex II had been amended accordingly:

That Annex II to the Convention be amended by omitting from the paragraph describing the northern boundary of the southern 'Winter Seasonal' Zone,

the words:

to the west coast of Australia at latitude 35° S., thence along the south coast of Australia to Cape Arid '

and inserting in their stead the words:—
'to the point latitude 35° 30'S., longitude 118° E., off the southern coast of Australia.

French text:-

Que l'annexe II à la Convention Internationale sur les lignes de Charge, 1930, soit corrigée en omettant du paragraphe au sujet de la limite Nord de la "Zone d'hiver périodique " méridionale les mots:-

On January 24, 1958, Her Majesty's Government informed the States parties to the Convention that an amendment to Annex II of the Convention, proposed by the Canadian Government, had been accepted by all Contracting Governments and that the amendment had been incorporated into the first paragraph of Annex II, which now reads as follows:—

' The southern boundary of the northern ' Winter Seasonal' zone is a line drawn from the east coast of North America along the parallel of latitude 36° N.

to Tarifa in Spain; from the east coast of Korea along the parallel of latitude 35° N. to the west coast of Honshiu along the parallel of latitude 35° N. to longitude 150° W. and thence along a rhumb lime to the west coast of British Columbia at latitude 55° N., Fusan (Korea) and Yokohama to be considered as being on the boundary line of the northern 'Winter

Seasonal 'zone and the 'Summer 'zone."

As a result of the establishment of a Federal Government in the West Indies, the title of the "British Caribbean Meteorological Service" has been changed to "The West Indies Meteorological Service"; and the title of the member of the World Meteorological Organisation formerly known as the "British Caribbean Territories", and referred to above, has been changed to "The West Indies, the Bahamas, British Guiana, British Honduras, and the Virgin Islands". Both changes of title took effect from May 1, 1958.  On December 14, 1948, the Convention was extended to the "Malayan Territories", consisting of Singapore, the Federation of Malaya, North Borneo, Sarawak, and Brunei (Protected State). On June 6, 1958, Her Majesty's Government informed the World Meteorological Organisation that, following the withdrawal of Malaya from this group, the heading "Malayan Territories" should be changed to read "Singapore and the British territories in Borneo"; and that the territories listed under that heading now consist of Singapore, North Borneo, Sarawak and Brunei. ROAD TRAFFIC (continued)—
† The Convention was extended to Mauritius subject to the following declarations and reservations:

(a) In accordance with the provisions of paragraph 1 of Article 2 of the Convention the Government of Mauritius excludes Annex 2 from its application of the Convention;

(b) In accordance with the provisions of paragraph (b) of Section IV of Annex 6, the Government of Mauritius will only permit that one trailer be drawn by a vehicle, will not permit an articulated vehicle to draw a trailer or that articulated vehicles shall be used for the transport of passengers for hire or reward.
(c) The Government of Mauritius reserves the

right not to apply the provisions of paragraph 1 of Annex 8 of the said Convention whereby the minimum age for driving a motor vehicle under the conditions set out in Article 24 of the Convention shall be eighteen years.

The Convention was extended to St. Lucia and Trinidad subject to the following reservations:

(a) In connexion with Article 24 of the said Convention, the Governments of St. Lucia and Trinidad reserve the right not to permit a person to drive a vehicle, other than one brought into and only temporarily in St. Lucia and Trinidad,

> (i) the vehicle is used for the carriage of persons for hire or reward or for the carriage of goods, and

(ii) the driver of such vehicle would, by the domestic legislation of St. Lucia and Trinidad, be required to have a special vocational licence.

(b) In connexion with Article 26 of the said Convention, cycles in international traffic admitted to the territory shall, from nightfall and during the night or whenever atmospheric conditions render it necessary, show only a white light to the front, and show to the rear a red light and a red reflex reflector in accordance with the domestic legislation of St. Lucia and Trinidad.

Furthermore, the Governments of St. Lucia and

Trinidad hereby declare

(i) That, in accordance with the provisions of paragraph 1 of Article 2 of the said Convention, they exclude Annexes 1 and 2 from their application of the Convention.

(ii) That, in accordance with the provisions of paragraph (b) of Section IV of Annex 6 to the said Convention, they will only permit that one trailer be drawn by a vehicle, that they will not permit an articulated vehicle to draw a trailer and that they will not permit articulated vehicles to be used for the transport of passengers for hire or reward.

§ The Convention was extended to Singapore

subject to the following declaration:

In accordance with the provisions of paragraph 1 of Article 2 of the Convention, the Government of Singapore excludes Annexes 1 and 2 from its application of the Convention.
