EXCHANGE OF NOTES BETWEEN THE GOVERNMENT OF THE UNITED KINGDOM OF GREAT BRITAIN AND NORTHERN IRELAND AND THE GOVERNMENT OF GREECE FOR THE RECIPROCAL ABOLITION OF VISAS

Her Majesty's Ambassador at Athens to the Greek Minister for Foreign Affairs

British Embassy, Athens, 8 June, 1965.

Monsieur le Ministre,

I have the honour to refer to the Agreement constituted by the Exchange of Notes between the Government of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Northern Ireland and the Greek Government of the 1st of June, 1953,(1) for the reciprocal abolition of visas for travel to the United Kingdom and Greece.

- 2. Acting upon instructions from Her Majesty's Principal Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs, I am to state that in accordance with their policy of extending the freedom of travel, the Government of the United Kingdom now wish to propose an agreement in the following terms to replace that of the 1st of June, 1953:
 - (a) Subject to the provisions of sub-paragraphs (c) and (d) below, Greek nationals holding valid Greek passports shall be free to travel from any place whatever to the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Northern Ireland, The Channel Islands and the Isle of Man and to any of the territories named in the Annex to the present Note without the necessity of obtaining a visa in advance.
 - (b) Subject to the provisions of sub-paragraphs (c) and (d) below, British subjects and British Protected Persons holding passports bearing on the cover the inscription 'British Passport' at the top, and at the bottom the inscription 'United Kingdom of Great Britain and Northern Ireland' or 'Jersey' or 'Guernsey and its dependencies' or the name of one of the British dependent territories listed in the Annex to this Agreement, and, inside, the description of the holder's national status as 'British subject' or 'British subject, citizen of the United Kingdom and Colonies', or 'British subject, citizen of the United Kingdom, Islands and Colonies', or 'British protected Person' shall be free to travel from any place whatever to Greece without the necessity of obtaining a visa in advance.
 - (c) The provisions of sub-paragraphs (a) and (b) above shall not exempt Greek nationals proceeding to any British territory or British subjects or British protected persons proceeding to Greece from the necessity

of complying with, respectively, the laws and regulations of the British territory concerned, or of Greece, relating to the entry, residence (temporary or permanent) and employment or occupation of foreigners. Travellers who are unable to satisfy the competent authorities that they comply with these laws and regulations are liable to be refused leave to enter or to land.

- (d) The competent British and Greek authorities reserve the right to refuse leave to enter or stay in their respective territories in any case where the person concerned is considered undesirable by those authorities or is otherwise ineligible under the general policy of the respective Governments relating to the entry or stay of aliens.
- (e) Either Government may suspend the foregoing provisions in whole or in part for reasons of public policy and the suspension shall be notified immediately to the other Government through the diplomatic channel.
- (f) Either Government may denounce the Agreement subject to thirty days' notice in writing through the diplomatic channel.
- 3. If the above proposals are acceptable to the Greek Government I have the honour to suggest that the present Note, together with its Annex and Your Excellency's reply to that effect should constitute an Agreement between the two Governments in this matter which shall enter into force thirty days after the date of Your Excellency's Note and shall be regarded from its entry into force as abrogating and replacing the Agreement of the 1st of June, 1953, referred to in paragraph one above.

I avail myself of this opportunity to renew to Your Excellency the assurances of my highest consideration.
