Sir,

I refer to the Convention on the Privileges and Immunities of the Specialised Agencies<sup>(1)</sup>, and in particular to Section 10 of the Convention, in view of alterations in the tax system of the United Kingdom.

I now propose that Section 10 should be interpreted and applied in the United Kingdom so as to accord the International Telecommunication Union a refund of car tax and value added tax on the purchase of new motor cars of United Kingdom manufacture, and of value added tax paid on the supply of goods or services necessary for its official activities and which are supplied on a recurring basis or involve considerable quantities of goods or considerable expenditure.

If the foregoing proposals are acceptable to the International Telecommunication Union I propose that this Note, together with your reply in that sense, shall constitute an Agreement between the Government of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Northern Ireland and the International Telecommunication Union which shall enter into force on the date on which the United Kingdom legislation giving effect to the Agreement comes into operation, which date will be notified to the International Telecommunication Union.<sup>(2)</sup>

I avail myself of this opportunity to renew, Sir, the assurance of my highest consideration.
